Stoke Newington Cricket Club - Safeguarding Policy Statement



Stoke Newington Cricket Club (The Club) is committed to ensuring all Children (i.e. all persons under the age of 18) participating in cricket have a safe and positive experience. We do this by:

- 1) Putting things in place
- 2) Having the right people in place
- 3) Having a clear route for what to do if you have a concern
- 4) Applying and embedding cricket specific guidance

Putting things in place

- We recognise that all children participating in cricket (regardless of age, gender, race, religion, sexual orientation, ability or disability) have the right to have fun and be protected from harm in a safe environment.
- We ensure individuals working within cricket at, or for, our club provide a welcoming, safe, and fun experience for children
- We provide an environment where the views of children, parents and volunteers are sought
 and welcomed on a range of issues. This will help us create an environment where people
 have the opportunity to voice any concerns (about possible suspected child abuse/neglect,
 and/or about poor practice) to the Club Safeguarding Officer.
- We adopt and implement the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) "Safe Hands Cricket's Policy for Safeguarding Children".
- We ensure all individuals working within cricket at, or for, the club are recruited and appointed in accordance with ECB guidelines and relevant legislation.

Having the Right People in Place

- We have appointed Club Safeguarding Officers who have attended the training modules required by the ECB.
- Our Club Safeguarding Officers are as follows:





Club Safeguarding Role

The Club's Safeguarding Officers are:

- The first point of contact for parents, children and volunteers/staff within the club.
- A local source of procedural advice for the Club, its Committee and Members.
- The main point of contact within the club for the ECB County Safeguarding Officer and the ECB Safeguarding Team.
- The main point of contact within the club for relevant external agencies in connection with child safeguarding.

They are responsible for ensuring correct and comprehensive reporting procedures exist for raising and managing child safeguarding concerns.

What to do if you have a concern

- Contact one of the Club's Safeguarding Officers.
- We ensure all suspicions, concerns and allegations are taken seriously and dealt with swiftly and appropriately.
- We ensure access to confidential information relating to child safeguarding matters is
 restricted to those who need to know, in order to safeguard children including the Club
 Safeguarding Officers and the appropriate external authorities, such as the Local Authority
 Designated Officer (LADO), as specified within ECB child safeguarding procedures.

Cricket Specific Advice

- We ensure all individuals working within cricket at, or for, the club are provided with support, through education and training, so they are aware of, and can adhere to, good practice and Code of Conduct guidelines defined by the ECB, and the club.
- We ensure all people who work in cricket at, or for, our club (such as staff, officials, volunteers, team managers, coaches and so on) understand how the "Safe Hands Policy" applies to them.
